# **Executive Summary**

## AP-05 Executive Summary - 91.200(c), 91.220(b)

#### 1. Introduction

During the program year 2018, the City of Overland Park intends to continue to focus on using CDBG funds for neighborhood improvements in low and moderate income areas of the city. Neighborhood indicators have shown that low and moderate income areas in the city will become blighted if preventative actions are not taken during the next five years to address the condition of housing stock, public infrastructure and public amenities.

Projects will be focused on housing improvements, public facility improvements and public service provision, including minor home rehabilitation, street improvements, emergency shelter improvements and housing stabilization services.

#### 2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

In 2018, funding will be invested in the City of Overland Park to improve the overall conditions in neighborhoods at risk of decline by removing conditions that allow for property deterioration, an increase in crime, or general decline. The objective is to focus resources on public infrastructure and housing stock in CDBG-eligible areas, to provide a positive visual impact, and to promote social stability and public safety. The desired outcome is to enhance the quality of life for a population that struggles to provide life necessities, such as decent, affordable housing and an environment that supports healthy households.

#### 3. Evaluation of past performance

The City continues to meet the goals and objectives as set forth in the 2015–2019 Consolidated Action Plan, with primary focus on activities benefitting low and moderate income persons.

#### 4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

Citizen participation and input on the community-wide level is obtained through specific-purpose public hearings, work sessions, and public meetings held by the CDBG Citizens' Advisory Committee. The CDBG Citizens' Advisory Committee met throughout 2017, including on July 13, 2017, July 20, 2017, August 10, 2017 and November 9, 2017 to discuss and provide recommendations for the Action Plan. The 2018 draft Action Plan was available for public comment from April 25, 2018 through June 18, 2018, and was made available to the public on the City's website, Overland Park City Hall, Overland Park Community Services Office, and the Johnson County Central Library. A public hearing was held at the City Council meeting on June 18, 2018. [Insert public comments if received.]

The development of the Action Plan is also supported by extensive data analysis termed

"Neighborhood Indicators," which use more than a dozen sources of geographically-linked data on housing stock, occupancy, homeownership, population, income, code enforcement, and crime-related incidents. A weighted scoring system applied to data from the past five years helps to identify emerging trends and effects of external factors, such as changing social and economic conditions. In addition, City staff within the Planning and Development Services Department actively participates in the Johnson County Continuum of Care, as well as a variety of social service projects that link local agencies with schools and community policing efforts.

#### 5. Summary of public comments

The City of Overland Park encourages citizens to participate in the development of the consolidated plan, any substantial amendments to the consolidated plan, and performance reports, as well as the review of substantial amendments to the Citizens' Participation Plan (CPP). It will continue to provide opportunities for participation as set forth in its Community Development Block Grant Citizens' Participation Plan, which was updated and adopted in July 2011, and reviewed each year since. The CPP was reviewed in 2016 and 2017, and updates were approved by the CDBG Citizen Advisory Committee on March 23, 2017 and by City Council on April 17, 2017. The review prompted a decision to make significant updates in preparation for changes to align with Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing.

The Mayor's office appoints an advisory group of diverse citizens, known as the CDBG Citizens' Advisory Committee. In addition to public meetings of the Advisory Committee and public hearings, the participation process includes periodic consultation with neighborhood leaders through the Neighborhood Conservation Program's Neighborhood Executive Committee, the Overland Park Fair Housing Committee, and local social service agencies through the Johnson County Continuum of Care. The Overland Park City Council is consulted during annual discussions regarding the CAPER during a meeting of the City's Community Development Committee.

Public notices are published and electronic notifications are provided for every CDBG Citizens' Advisory Committee meeting on the City of Overland Park web site. Email notices are sent to a city-wide database of interested parties, as well as to Kansas City Metro Area news outlets. A similar public notice process is followed for every Community Development Committee, Neighborhood Executive Committee and City Council meeting. Paper copies of the CAPER report and each Annual Action Plan are made available for public access at the City's Community Services office and at the Johnson County Central Resource Library.

The draft 2018 Action Plan was available for public comment from April 25, 2018 through June 18, 2018 and was made available to the public on the City's website, Overland Park City Hall, Overland Park Community Services Office, and the Johnson County Central Library. A public hearing was held at the City Council meeting on June 18, 2018. [Insert public comments if received.]

The City of Overland Park ensures of services provided within the jurisdiction through participation in the Johnson County Continuum of Care, where City staff is able to develop relationships with other local entities and social services provides through which collaborative projects can be identified.

The Johnson County Housing Authority is the public housing provider for residents within the City of Overland Park. City staff monitors data related to public housing utilization within the city in order to continue to understand the housing needs of the community.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

Prompted by the intersection between homeless persons and the low and moderate income persons served through public service projects, the City of Overland Park staff attends meetings of the Johnson County Continuum of Care and participates in committees, such as the Housing Committee and Coordinated Entry. The City also provides funding for the stability of emergency shelters within the community.

The City of Overland Park provides financial support to the Human Service Fund through United Community Services, which supports local social services agencies in their efforts to address the needs of households in poverty through projects such as child care, mental and physical health, and financial literacy and education.

The City also provides financial support to Johnson County's Human Services Department, which administers emergency assistance for households experiencing homelessness or households at risk of homelessness in order to address housing instability within the community.

# Explain how federal funds will leverage those additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements will be satisfied

The City will continue to provide 25% local match for HOME program, as well as designated funding from the General Fund to local public service agencies that assist with the housing stability needs of low and moderate income households. The programs funded through the City include Johnson County's Emergency and Utility assistance programs and United Community Services.

# If appropriate, describe publically owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that may be used to address the needs identified in the plan

There are no known publically-owned properties identified as appropriate to be used to address the needs identified in this plan.

#### Discussion

The City of Overland Park has determined that if the 2018 CDBG allocation is less than the anticipated \$600,000.00, the grant funding will be calculated as follows:

- 1. All allocations will be reduced on a pro-rata basis for the amount below \$600,000;
- 2. Public Service projects will not exceed 15% of the total allocation.

The City of Overland Park has determined that if the 2018 CDBG allocation exceeds the anticipated \$600,000.00, the grant funding will be calculated as follows:

- 1. Administration allocation will remain at \$100,000;
- 2. Public Works Department will be funded up to their initial request;
- 3. Each Public Service project will be funded up to their initial request, with the total of Public Service projects not to exceed 15% of the total allocation;
- 4. Friends of JCDS, Inc. will be funded up to their initial request;
- 5. Any additional funds will remain as unobligated funds.

The City of Overland Park has determined that unobligated funds will be allocated to the following projects as needed:

- 1. Housing;
- 2. Public Facilities;
- 3. Sudden opportunity projects, with priority to projects as defined by the CDBG Program Objectives.

#### Rationale for the priorities for allocating investments geographically

In an effort to prevent slum and blighted conditions in the older sections of the city, the City of Overland Park has implemented a neighborhood task force to study the needs of older neighborhoods in the city. The City's Neighborhood Services department holds regular meetings with neighborhood leaders for their feedback on the improvements needed in their communities and to discuss how not addressing issues will allow for disrepair in these communities and cause otherwise livable neighborhoods to become blighted.

#### Discussion

The City of Overland Park seeks to target those areas HUD has indicated to be in the low and moderate income areas by providing improvement projects for streets, street lighting, neighborhood parks, curbs, sidewalks and other public amenities that will help keep neighborhoods safe and livable.

#### AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing -91.420, 91.220(j)

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

The City utilizes extensive data analysis termed "Neighborhood Indicators," which use more than a dozen sources of geographically-linked data on housing stock, occupancy, homeownership, population, income, code enforcement, and crime-related incidents. A weighted scoring system applied to data from the past five years helps to identify emerging trends and effects of external factors, such as changing social and economic conditions. The City will continue to evaluate how public policies impact affordable housing through the comparison of the data to new programs, such as the City's new Rental Licensing Program, which will address code deficiencies within rental housing in Overland Park.

In July 2017, the City initiated a rental licensing program that requires bi-annual inspections of all rental properties. The program's goal is to pro-actively address property maintenance code violations and improve conditions of all residential rental units.

The City has an advisory committee, organized by Council resolution. The group has embarked on a strategic planning effort to re-focus its activities to support affirmatively further fair housing.

## AP-85 Other Actions - 91.420, 91.220(k)

#### Introduction

During years 2015-2019, the city plan to target its CDBG resources to make neighborhood improvements in the low and moderate income areas of the city. Neighborhood Indicators have shown that these areas will become blighted if preventative actions are not taken during the next five years to prevent deteriorating conditions.

Focus will be placed on minor home rehabilitation, street reconstruction, street lighting improvements, new curbs and sidewalks, and public amenities.

#### Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

Advertise funding and grant opportunities in local newspapers, the city's website and quarterly city-wide newsletters that funds are available to assist with:

- 1. Neighborhood improvements, such as street reconstructions, curbs, sidewalks and improved street lighting;
- 2. Minor home repairs; and
- 3. Accessibility updates or improvements.

#### Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

The City of Overland Park provides funding to Johnson County Human Services for the Minor Home Rehabilitation Program, which strengthens neighborhoods through improvements to the quality of existing housing for low and moderate income households. Financial support for this program fosters and maintains affordable housing by assisting low income households with maintaining the safety of their housing through home repair projects that they may not otherwise be able to address. The City will also continue to provide match funding to Johnson County's HOME Program in order to increase the number of low income households that will be able to receive home rehabilitation projects that are vital to the long-term stability of their houses.

Funding is also provided to Catholic Charities, Hillcrest Transitional Housing, The Salvation Army, and Johnson County which provide emergency assistance to households with housing instability. These programs assist low income households in maintaining their housing, as well as providing case management services to connect households to affordable housing options within the community.

In 2016, the City approved a rental licensing program that requires bi-annual inspections of all rental properties. Its aim is to pro-actively address property maintenance code violations and improve conditions of all residential rental units.

The City has an advisory committee, organized by Council resolution. The group has embarked on a strategic planning effort to re-focus its activities to support affirmatively further fair housing.

#### Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

All minor home repair projects that require paint being disturbed will be remediated by Johnson County Housing Program. The county has staff trained in Lead Safe Practices, certified as lead-based paint inspectors and risk assessors, along with several contractors certified as lead-based abatement supervisors and certified lead-based workers. The terms and conditions established in the City's contracts with the county for the MHR program require the county to meet federal rules and regulations regarding lead-based paint. The city approves the scope of work for each project as well as each Tier II Environmental Review Reports and monitors program compliance with lead-based paint requirements. When lead-based paint hazards are identified, City staff and Johnson County staff work together to assure the correct measures are taken to protect occupants and workers.

#### Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

This is a county-wide, state-wide and nation-wide effort. The City of Overland Park will continue to look for opportunities for collaboration in efforts that reduce the stress of poverty-level families through efforts towards providing safe neighborhoods, neighborhood stabilization programs, education opportunities, and housing stabilization services and assistance.

Through a long-standing collaboration with United Community Services, the City provides funding annually to the Human Services Fund to provide financial support to various social service agencies that provide services to low income households. This collaboration ensures that the needs of those who live and work within the city are identified and addressed.

The City will also continue to support Johnson County's Minor Home Repair Program for low income households. In addition, the City will introduce the Rental Licensing Program through the codes enforcement division, which will address deficiencies within rental housing.

#### Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The City of Overland Park's Planning and Development Department manages the administration of the Community Development Block Grant Program. In 2016, the City undertook a multi-departmental restructuring for the administration all aspects of the CDBG program, including but not limited to segregations of duties, appropriate legal support, and cross-training for the Environmental Review process.

# Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

The City of Overland Park will continue to work with the Johnson County Continuum of Care in order to monitor the impact of the services provided by agencies with projects funded through CDBG. Additionally, the City of Overland Park will continue to provide support to the housing stability needs of community members through the funded through the City's general funds. The City will also continue to collaborate with United Community Services to provide financial support to local social service agencies that provide vital stabilization services to low income households within the community.

#### Discussion

The Strategic Plan of the 2015-2019 Consolidated Plan reflects areas of intent for how the anticipated CDBG funding will be implemented and shows the efforts planned for neighborhood improvements.
